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CONFEDERATED TRIBES OF THE COLVILLE RESERVATION

Colville Tribes Enforces Public Health Rules

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NESPELEM, WA – The Colville Tribes notifies all residents or visitors within the Colville Reservation that public safety laws will be strictly enforced during the current spike in COVID-19 cases. The Tribal Health Department is issuing specific orders to infected or exposed people which are intended to control the spread of the disease. These orders may be for an individual to quarantine or isolate and avoid all contact with others. Any violation of a Tribal Health order is a criminal Class A violation of the Colville Tribal Criminal Code punishable by up to 360 days of jail or a \$5,000 fine.

All of the general public health restrictions in place since the beginning of the pandemic also continue to be strictly enforced and will remain in place until further notice. These rules include that the Reservation is closed to all non-essential traffic and visitors, residents of the Reservation are ordered to stay at home unless travel is essential, public gatherings or camping in groups of ten or more people is prohibited, all outdoor recreational activities are permitted only for tribal members and their immediate families who are residents of the Reservation, and all non-essential business activity on the Reservation is prohibited. Civil citations can range from a warning to a \$1,000 fine, or a \$2,000 fine for a second offense within 5 years.

The curfew imposed in the Inchelium District between the hours of 9:00 p.m. through 6:00 a.m. due to the extreme spike of cases also remains active. During the curfew, all residents and visitors within Inchelium must remain indoors unless travel is absolutely essential.

All known or suspected violations of quarantine and isolation orders or of public health orders may be reported to the Colville Tribal Police.

Reports may be submitted at the Tribal Police dispatch number, 1-(800)-551-5800, at any time of day or night.

The Vice Chairman of the Colville Tribes, Joel Boyd, said, "We are in the most serious period yet of the pandemic. The health orders are all based on medical advice and intended to protect the lives and health of everyone in our community. The Tribes will not allow anyone to break the law and put others at risk."

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About the Colville Tribes:

Today, more than 9,473 descendants of 12 aboriginal tribes of Indians are enrolled in the Confederated Tribes of the Colville. The twelve tribes which compose the Confederated Tribes of the Colville Reservation include: ščəlámxəx^w (deep water) or Chelan; walwama (Wallowa people) or Chief Joseph Band of Nez Perce; sx̄wy?iłp (sharp pointed trees) or Colville; šntiyátkwəxw (grass in the water) or Entiat; snSáyckst (speckled fish) or Lakes; mətxwu (blunt hills around a valley) or Methow; škwáxčənəxw (people living on the bank) or Moses-Columbia; nspilm (prairie) or Nespelem; uknaqin (seeing over the top) or Okanogan; palúšpam (people from Palouse) or Palus; sənpSwilx (grey mist as far as one can see) or San Poil, and šnpəšqwáwsəxw (people in between) or Wenatchi.
